Principal's Report



Dear UCHSK Community,

It is with great pleasure I write this Principal's message to you as the Acting Principal while Daniel Mowbray is taking some leave. He will resume his Principal duties on the 18th September so staff and students don't have to put up with me for too much longer.

Term 3 so far has been jam packed with many major events taking place including our Semester 1 Awards Ceremony, and an abundance of excursions including the Outdoor Recreation students enjoying a 3 day Snowsports trip.

It was great to celebrate the student achievement in Semester 1 at our Awards Ceremony. I would like to pass on my sincere congratulations to all of our award winners from last semester. Being able to celebrate success is a significant factor in motivating us to achieve even bigger things in the future. It was wonderful to celebrate with all of these students and their families at our week 1 ceremony. In fact, Mr Mowbray was absent for that ceremony too – I am starting to see a pattern!

Every year the School Board play an important role in the school improvement process. One of the key roles of the Board is to review school policy and update those where required. We are currently developing a policy to cover the rise of Artificial Intelligence software and its use and misuse in education. Critical in all policy development is consultation with all stakeholders. Parents and carers have had, and will continue to have, this opportunity through dedicated discussions during P&C

meetings. If you would like to be involved in the community consultation you are encouraged to make contact with the P&C.

Term 3 is always a very busy time in schools. Teachers and students are all working to ensure that high levels of learning are happening in every class room. As we progress towards the end of the school year, I encourage you to have a conversation with your young people about how they feel they are tracking in each of their classes. If there is any degree of uncertainty or concern, please contact their Year Coordinator to discuss what more can be done to ensure success at the year's end. Progress reports will be sent home on Thursday 26th October and we will also have our final Parent Teacher Interviews in Wk 4. This round of interviews will be online and, in an effort to support families, will be offered in morning and afternoon timeslots from Monday 30th October through to Thursday 2nd November. It is also a really good time to remind all students of how best to set themselves up for success in each and every lesson. This includes:

- Arriving at all classes on time, line up and be ready to learn with appropriate equipment and a charged Chromebook.
- Avoiding unnecessary distractions in classes, in particular using their Chromebook appropriately and adhering to our mobile phone policy "Learning time, in the bag."

Your support in reinforcing these messages is greatly appreciated.

We are also very excited to have begun the process of transitioning our new students coming into Yr 7 in 2024 and our Yr 10 students moving on and into Yr 11. Staff have been very busy organising events and contacting colleagues at other schools to ensure that all students transition as smoothly as possible. We have two Yr 6 transition days planned - October 31st and November 1st where we will welcome our incoming students and give them a taste of high school by engaging them in an English, Maths and Agriculture class. Our school will also conduct ongoing transition visits for those students with additional need that will benefit from having extra time in our building prior to 2024. Yr 10 students going to UC Lake Ginninderra College have already had a visit from College staff and have selected classes for next year. Both schools are currently working on a plan to support the transition of our students with additional needs and these details will be shared soon. At this stage we have 141 students coming into Yr 7 next year with 117 Yr 10 students moving on to college.

2024 will see some changes here at UC High School, one of the biggest will be the implementation of a new timetable structure. Whenever we consider change the question we ask is "Will it improve student learning?" Our current timetable consists of 3 x 90minute lessons each day with teachers seeing their classes twice a week. Although we are still in the process of determining exactly what the new timetable structure will be – it will be a combination of shorter and longer lessons and will also ensure that teachers are engaging with each class on at least 3 occasions throughout the week. A big thankyou to staff, school captains, SLG member and parents through our School Board and P & C that have contributed their thoughts and ideas during the process.

This year 9/10 Boys Football squad has been one of the strongest in recent years. We held trials last term and the boys trained really well in the lead up, and the quality of the boys was very high and I could have easily taken 22 boys who all would have come into the team and played very well.

We were placed in Group A, which panned out to be the strongest of the 3 Groups, which meant that we played:

Usually Daramalan and SFX are two of the teams who make the Final, and we had them both in our Group. We had Daramalan up first. We scored first through a great goal from Ollie. We were certainly the better team, but Daramalan equalised late in the match (only 12-minute halves!) and we drew the match. Our second game, we lost concentration early and conceded a goal. To the boys' credit, they rallied and equalised which meant that we drew that match also, despite being the stronger team and playing the more attractive football. We actually have lots of other teachers and students from other schools saying how well our team was playing and that they were impressed by our boys. We unfortunately lost against the run of play to SFX, again despite being the stronger team. Our match against Canberra was a tight one at 1-1, before Canberra showed their class and ran out eventual winners of that match 3-1.



To make it through to semi-finals, there were 3 groups and only the 1st placed team in each group made it through, with the best 2nd place across the 3 groups being the 4th team into the semis. Had we beaten Canberra, we were still in with a chance, but this year it was not meant to be.

I'd like to acknowledge the positive school spirit of the boys, the way they took on feedback and played to our team tactics, and the amazing representatives of UCHSK that they were on the day. I was proud to take this great group of young men out to show how they can play and be great ambassadors of our school. This was also done through the leadership of our captain, Haiden, and his deputy, Teale. The parents who came along to support the team were also really impressed with the way the boys played and behaved. It was a great day out — well done to all involved!

Teaching and Learning

Beyond Enrichment



This term we have continued to grow our Beyond program, with students being provided with a range of enrichment opportunities both inside and outside of the classroom. Additionally, we have welcomed all of our Year 7 Beyond cohort into the program, and they have been enjoying their first taste of ethics classes.

At the end of Week 5 we got all of our Beyond students together for an ethics challenge, with students working across year levels on a variety of ethical dilemmas. Since this whole group challenge we have had a couple of weeks off from our ethics classes. When we return to these classes in our year level groups, the focus will shift to the psychology of human behaviour - what drives us to make the decisions we make and how can we recognise when we may be influenced to make decisions that are not necessarily ethical?



On Friday of Week 7, ten of our Years 7 & 8 Beyond students spent the day at the ACT Legislative Assembly, where they met some of Canberra's MLA's, learnt about the parliamentary committee process, and engaged in an extended committee role play, where they had to research and present a submission to an Energy Committee about Canberra's energy future. All of these students did themselves and our school proud, and they were a credit to our school community.

Next term our school will enter 2 teams into the Ethics Olympiad, which gets students from schools across the ACT to consider and present on a range of ethical dilemmas. Hopefully our ethics seminars will pay off! Currently 8 students have put their hands up to participate in this, and we have 2 places remaining, so if your child is interested in participating in this event, please contact Mr Laenen to express their interest, or get them to visit him in the English / SOSE staffroom.

Earlier this year we were awarded a Board Grant to offer students in Years 9 and 10 an opportunity to receive some basic flight training and use a flight simulator. Thank you to Ms Comans who put the hard work into getting this organised, as well as Mr Montgomery for his support in getting this enrichment opportunity 'off the ground'. This activity will be open to students in Years 9 and 10 who are interested in the maths and science behind air travel. Students who are interested will be asked to complete a short application form, so if your child wishes to participate, please make sure they keep an ear out for announcements about this activity.



Finally, all 4 of the core subjects currently involved in Beyond - English, Maths, Science and SOSE - have been working hard to integrate extension activities within their lessons and assessment. English and SOSE have added extension questions to their assignments, which provide students with prompts that require a deeper level of content knowledge and skills. These extension questions will be clearly marked as such on assessment tasks sheets. Maths has ensured that their test questions are written in ascending order of difficulty, with the final question being one that will push students to extend themselves Beyond what is required in the curriculum. Maths students can also access classroom and digital resources that can provide further extension. In Science, Beyond students are being provided with opportunities to design their own experiments when possible, and will also be given extension questions on tests, as well as open-ended questions that require deep answers. Please note that the extension tasks offered through Beyond are open to all of our students and we encourage any student who would like to challenge themselves to attempt the extension tasks that interest them.

Japanese News

In Week 10 of this term some of our Japanese students will be accompanied by the Languages faculty - Ms Emerson, Ms Melvin and Mr Laenen - on an overnight excursion to Sydney. This excursion has been planned as a language and cultural experience, and will see students visiting the Nihongo Tanken Centre and Japan Foundation Centre, as well as a night of Japanese dining and karaoke. We are all looking forward to this excursion and hope that the students attending will get a lot out of their trip to Sydney. Many thanks to Ms Emerson and Ms Melvin who both put in countless hours to organise this excursion.

Earlier this year the Japanese faculty was awarded a Board Grant to update our collection of language learning resources. Through this Grant we have been able to purchase a range of Japanese readers and other resources, so that all students in Japanese will be able to access Japanese reading

material suitable for them. This will be a great resource for now and into the future, and we thank the Board very much for their contribution to our faculty.

Next term, Ms Emerson will be leaving us for 7 weeks, as she has won a grant through the Japan Foundation to complete an education and language training course in Japan. Congratulations Ms Emerson!!! This is an amazing opportunity for both Ms Emerson and UC Kaleen, as we know that she will bring back with her some great new ideas for languages at our school. I would like to take this opportunity to extend a very big thank you to Mr Mowbray for supporting Ms Emerson with this opportunity. With Ms Emerson studying in Japan, we will be joined next term by Ms Karyn Ang, who will take over Ms Emerson's classes in her absence. We look forward to welcoming Ms Ang as part of our faculty and school community.

Cultural Integrity

Birrigai

The Year 7 Cultural Integrity classes have been learning about the First Nations peoples and their cultures. Students enjoyed a day at Birrigai where they participated in a program simulating life in pre-colonial Australia. The students were tasked with making fire, building shelter, grinding seeds to make flour and 'hunting'. Each group of students, led by two Elders, had to negotiate with other Nations to get the goods they needed to complete their tasks. After lunch, the students experienced a first hand simulation of being removed from their land that they had worked hard to make their own. Students then came inside and explored the history of Australia, showing great empathy and understanding as they navigated through confronting stories. At the end of the day, the students were asked to reflect on their experiences by writing a single word. The words the students chose demonstrated understanding of the hardships and trauma the First Nations people faced as well as how we can move forward with reconciliation.

Students participated in dances and learned about various instruments, artifacts and costumes specific to the Islands. Ryka then introduce the significance of 'painting up' with ochre, explaining its importance and the meaning of the designs. Ryka gave us all a demonstration of the Didgeridoo and a few lucky students even got to try the Didgeridoo as well.

\$130 for the first child


\$100 for subsequent children

Your contribution is greatly valued and enables our school to deliver high quality educational programs for all


